UniSA Magill Campus

As mentioned on page one, the proposed closure of the Uni SA Magill campus is big news for us locally. The State Government has announced they want to buy it for \$60 million from Uni SA as part of their \$440 million Uni Merger proposal, however they are yet to say what they want to do with the land.

As Shadow Education Minister, I have been pursuing a range of questions about this merger through the Parliament and through the media. As a local MP, I am concerned about what the Government proposes to do with this precious site at Magill. The site includes significant open space, has important local environmental and biodiversity value, as wel as sporting and recreation facilities valued by many. The Childcare Centre is a critical community asset. The facilities include buildings of heritage value. Many local residents enjoy the site every day.

I've worked hard to establish a Parliamentary Committee inquiry into this proposal, of which I am a member, and that inquiry is now underway. If you have a view about any of these matters, I'd be keen to hear from you.

Early Childhood Royal Commission

In Morialta, we are very fortunate to be served by a range of excellent early childhood services, including Magill Kindergarten (pictured), and early childhood education is an important topic. One of the Government's election promises was to offer universal three year old preschool from 2026. Former Prime Minister Julia Gillard was appointed as a Royal Commissioner to work out the details of how this would work.

Many parents and prospective parents following this issue were disappointed to learn from Commissioner Gillard's Interim Report that universal preschool won't be delivered for all three year olds in 2026, and instead a rollout by 2032 is recommended. The final report is due soon so I hope to report on the Government's final plans in the next newsletter.

Dear Resident

Welcome to the latest edition of Morialta Matters. I hope you find the updates inside interesting and useful. Two issues raised with me every day are the rapidly increasing costs people are facing to live or do business, and concerns about the Government's failure to reduce ramping.

The average South Australian mortgage holder is about \$20,000 per year worse off than they were 18 months ago. Electricity prices, Council rates, household items and other bills have been very difficult to manage.

The state budget included some cost of living relief measures for concession holders, and the government extended the public school fee relief measures that I first announced as a former Education Minister at the beginning of last year, but there was very little else for homeowners or small businesses. The Liberal Opposition will continue to pressure the government to do more to assist these South Australians, who are doing it tough.

In regards to health, I found it remarkable that the Premier has been boasting about his government's performance in this area. We all remember that his central election promise was that he'd fix ramping, yet the last year has seen twelve months of ramping exceeding 3000 hours — a figure higher than any reached under any former government. I don't like these newsletters to be negative, but this is one area where we will keep holding the government to account.

Inside this issue there is news about some major issues, including the Government's proposed uni merger and land acquisition at Magill, the state Budget, and also some good news stories about our local community. Enjoy!

Morialta local traffic survey

Are there any local traffic issues that really grind your gears? Whether as a commuter, a user of public transport, a cyclist, pedestrian or whatever other way you use our transport infrastructure, if you live in Morialta then I want to hear from you! I'm always keen to push for better services and infrastructure for our area. Over the years, I have advocated for the upgrade of Paradise Interchange, better services and a range of improved

intersections and pedestrian crossings around the electorate. We've had some good wins.

One particular current priority is the need for a new Road Management Plan for the area including St Bernards Road, Penfold Road, the Parade, Magill Road, Norton Summit Road and Glen Stuart Road. Along with neighbouring MP Vincent Tarzia, we have been making the point that the old Road Management Plan, done a decade ago, is now out of date. There has been substantial infill, new developments and we also have changing traffic pressures as a result of the new school.

A new plan will engage experts, update the data, consult with community, and make recommendations for new investments, and we hope the Government will get on board.

Mid Year Entry for Pre-School

Many local children born in May or later in 2019 experienced their first day at preschool as part of mid-year entry in recent weeks. This is part of the Government's move to reintroduce mid-year reception entry next year in public schools.

As Shadow Education Minister I have welcomed this move in a bipartisan way. It is a logical step to take after our major change of moving year 7 to high school, achieved during the term of the former Liberal Government.

Preschool directors, such as the excellent Marnie Hillier at Highbury Preschool (pictured), and preschool staff across Morialta have worked extremely hard to prepare our sites for this change and I congratulate them on their efforts. Well done!



Morialta Secondary College first day

Two of my proudest days as the local MP for Morialta and Education Minister were, first, the day I cancelled Labor's plans to sell off the old Norwood Morialta middle campus site, and then, second, the day we confirmed a new school would be built on the site. The old buildings were no longer fit for purpose or capable of being renovated, and a brand new school was needed. There is still some work being completed on some of the buildings, but the first cohort of year 7 students have now been at the school for most of this year, and the facilities they are already using are outstanding. It was a great joy to be able to join with Principal Roley Coulter, governing council members and staff as the students experienced their first day at the new school, and I know these young people are going to achieve great things in the years ahead.
